ANNUAL REPORT

2022/2023

Dear C5 Georgia Supporters,

As C5 Georgia navigated the challenges of the Covid Pandemic in 2020 and 2021, where we pivoted entirely to virtual programming, we learned that we are truly "challenge ready". In 2022 we returned to in person programming with complementary virtual activities and in 2023 we conducted all programming in person.

We remain committed to our mission and the communities we serve in the metro Atlanta Area. We continue to emphasize the 5 C's in all that we do; Challenge Ready, Character Driven, Community Focused, College/Career Bound and Committed to a Better Future. The C5 Georgia program remains relevant and continues to positively impact the lives of our students.

We delivered on the following key milestones during 2022 and 2023:

- 265 students participated in our program.
- Increased incoming classes by 25%.
- 100% of C5 Georgia students graduated from high school.
- \$12M in scholarship offers have been awarded to C5 Georgia students.
- Our Alumni Association has been re-energized, helping to connect C5 alumni to internships and jobs and increase the support they give to C5.
- 474 volunteers helped with annual selection, fundraising, programming, and special events.
- Increased our reserve funding by 100% after reaching cash flow positive in 2020.
- Added new board members to fill gaps in support, i.e., legal, HR, finance, etc.

The strategic vision for the next 3 years is:

- 1. Update the curriculum to include mental health support and a career exploration/ mentoring program, staying current with the needs of students.
- 2. Grow our student base by 20% each year over the next three years to expand our reach.
- 3. Find new sources of funding and increase overall funding each year.

We have made considerable progress over the past two years and our success is directly attributed to the exceptional work of our staff and Board of Directors. We appreciate our "heroes," donors and volunteers for their support and belief in the work we do. Together, we will continue to make more possible for our C5 Georgia students every year.







2022-2023 IMPACT

Leadership Camp

200+ Flints and Lanterns (rising 8th & 9th graders) participated in leadership curriculum that included accountability, responsibility, goal setting, team building, appreciating diversity, community service, communication, and much more. Students learned independence and how to lead themselves and others in a technology absent (no phones or internet) environment. This C5 Georgia foundational experience takes place each summer in a residential setting for 24 days in the North Georgia Mountains and includes general camp activities like fishing, archery, canoeing, hiking, art expression, and STEM club.

Bridges Trek

Hammers (rising sophomores) started prepping in the Fall for their back country trek. This experience is the "Bridge" between learning about leadership and applying leadership skills to real situations and real community projects. Bridges Trek builds the experience and confidence needed to actually lead. It also teaches the principle of being ready for the challenges of life. Students use decision making skills, team building, critical thinking, and problem solving while on this 7 day trek. We partner with the National Outdoor Leadership School (NOLS) for this summer experience. In 2022, 40 teens hiked the Grand Tetons in Wyoming and in 2023, 40 teens hiked the Adirondack Mountains in New York.

Road to College

Compasses (rising juniors) continued their college exploration journey with the "the Road to College" bus tour. This 5-day trip is packed with visits to private, public, HBCU's, and Technical colleges to gain a feel for different post secondary options. In 2022-2023, 70 students visited schools in Georgia, South Carolina, Tennessee, Alabama and North Carolina. In addition, throughout the year they participate in college prep activities like scholarship, financial aid, and college application work. All experiences during this year are related to finding the perfect fit for post high school.

ACT Now! Summit

Medallions (rising seniors) participated in the ACT Now! Summit on Emory University's campus. The purpose of the summit is to introduce youth to an effective process for identifying and addressing significant issues facing their community. During the school year, students survey members of the community and start the process of identifying a community problem they wish to solve. They meet and work in committees on various pieces of the problem to be solved. At the ACT Now! Summit, members of the community come and speak about the topic and support the students in their goal of solving the problem. 70 students participated over the past two years.

In addition to the year-round pathways and summer experiences, students participate in community service projects, career exploration events, career mentoring programming, enrichment activities, and gatherings to build the C5 community.


